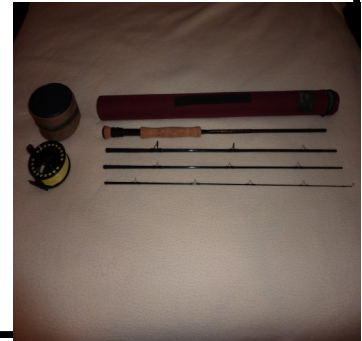
Club News

NEWS FROM AROUND THE COUNTRY

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — Biologists at Yellowstone National Park plan to kill rainbow trout at three lakes in the park this week so they can restock the waters next year with native fish.

The work will include Goose Lake, in the lower Geyser Basin, and two other lakes nearby. The project will not affect the nearby Firehole River.

Rainbow trout were stocked in Goose Lake and the other two lakes decades ago. They can breed with native cutthroat trout and produce hybrids which also are a nonnative species.

The park will put up warning signs at the lakes and visitors will be advised not to swim in or drink from them through mid-October. The park will reintroduce genetically pure West slope cutthroat trout to the lakes next year.

MOUNT SOLON, Virginia— It's not unusual for anglers in waders and fishing vests to walk through the yard behind Brian Trow's wood-sided home nestled on the banks of Mossy Creek.

"If we are cooking out on the back porch, they usually just wave and go on," said 32-year-old Brian Trow, who lives there with his wife and 2-year-old son.

Trucks drive through his yard too, and his neighbors' yards, stopping frequently to toss a few dozen trout from buckets or nets into the creek.

"It's great," Trow said. "I'll never move from here. I'll never sell this house."

For the past 32 years, landowners along stretches of Mossy Creek have cooperated with the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries to allow thousands of brown trout to be stocked annually as part of a state-wide stocking program.

Wetsuit-clad workers for Limestone Springs Preserve in Richland spent part of Wednesday baiting nearby waters. As trout took the bait, the employees netted them and returned the escapees to the trout-farm's 19th Century limestone quarry waters.

The preserve is asking the Fish and Boat Commission to set up a no-fishing zone until they can get all the fish back. The lost trout could be worth up to \$400,000.

As workers scramble to catch the fish, they face another obstacle -- other fishermen. Some anglers have lined up along creek and stream banks in their own bid to hook the escaped fish.

Limestone earns its money by charging fisherman to fish in their private preserve, as well as selling some trout for stocking and some as food

Weather Affects Angling Tactics

Timing and density of hatches benefits anglers on overcast days. On warm, bright days, hatch activity usually starts earlier in the day but will be shorter in duration, often producing brief but very intense activity. Conversely on cloudy days hatches show a later onset but will produce

greater numbers of bugs for a longer period of time. Longer hatches gives the angler a better opportunity to make some mistakes and still have a chance to catch a good number of fish. During very intense hatches the angler sometimes struggles to get his fly noticed among a raft of natu-

rals. The time taken to change flies or untangle a leader may also burn up a large portion of a trout's feeding activity.

The Northwest Territories by Rick Say



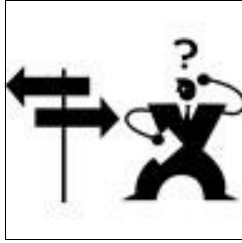
I arrived in Fort Smith on June 13th, two days before my scheduled departure to the Taltson River. Fort Smith is 880 miles North of Edmonton and has a population of 2,500 people half of which are Indian. Lia, the wife of my guide picked me up at the airport and invited me out to dinner that evening. Alex was due back from the bush

later that afternoon and would join us. Lia told me that Fort Smith got started as a portage town. Two rivers merge there and flow all the way to the Arctic Ocean. The rivers were the means of moving freight north before the railroads were built. There are a series of rapids at Fort Smith and all the goods had to be unload-

ed from the barges and hand carried around them. At dinner I met several people who had just come back from the bush with Alex. They told me they had snow on the last three days of their trip and were stuck in camp because of heavy winds. From what I could tell the weather was pretty brutal. Walking around town the next day I got the impression the locals were yearning for warmer weather. Here it was June 14th and the temperature was only 50 degrees. I bought a pair of gloves as the temperature dropped to 40 degrees, and I spent most of the afternoon watching the pelicans nesting on the rocks in the rapids. Later Lia cooked dinner at her house and I got a chance to meet the seven people who would be my closest companions for the next twelve days. Tomorrow morning we were to fly out 250 miles northeast into the wilderness to camp canoe and fish for twelve days .(To be continued)

From Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-276)

Take Exit 333 (Norristown - old exit 25). At the end of the ramp, turn left onto Plymouth Road. At the light, turn right onto Germantown Pike West. Continue approximately one (1) mile, through four (4) traffic lights (not counting the left hand turn light at Sandy Hill Road). At the fifth light, turn right onto Jolly Road. The Community Center is on the right at 2910 Jolly Road.

From Blue Route (I-476)

Take exit for Germantown Pike West (Exit 20). Continue on Germantown Pike west for approximately one (1) mile, through five (5) traffic lights (not counting the left hand turn light at Sandy Hill Road). At the fifth light, turn right onto Jolly Road. The Community Center is on the right at 2910 Jolly Road.

From Route 202

Follow Route 202 to Germantown Pike. Travel EAST on Germantown Pike, through five (5) traffic lights. At the next traffic light, approximately half a mile, turn left onto Jolly Road. The Community Center is on the right at 2910 Jolly Road.
